I. <u>CALL TO ORDER</u>

Mayor Habib called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm and requested Councilmember McClary to lead in the invocation and Pledge of Allegiance.

II. <u>GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENTS</u>: Note: All comments sent to the City Clerk by 12:00 noon on the date of this meeting, via US Mail or Email, as stated on the meeting Agenda, were forwarded to City Council.

Mr. Keith Carter, 346 Camelot Drive, stated his concerns to City Council regarding traffic issues wherein people are using Camelot Drive as a cut through to Pineview Boulevard. He stated he spoke with Lt. Quinn about providing traffic enforcement in that area. She stated she would turn in a traffic complaint to see what could be done. Mayor Habib thanked Mr. Carter and stated he was sure the complaint was forwarded to the right individuals, and they would look into the matter.

Motion: Councilmember Green-Fletcher; Second: Councilmember McClary Discussion: None. Carried: All ayes.

IV. PRESENTATIONS & PROCLAMATIONS:

a. Presentation to City Council – One Region Roadmap (Brent Jonas, Director Stakeholder Relations, Charleston Regional Development Alliance)

Mr. Jonas provided City Council with a briefing of the One Region Roadmap Project and how we are all impacted by growth within our area, strengthen our local economy and how we move forward with strategies and actions. He stated One Region is working closely with three (3) groups, elected officials, business community and our residents. Mr. Jonas stated he welcomed any input from City Council and the public with any questions or comments.

V. OLD BUSINESS & PUBLIC HEARINGS

 a. AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF GOOSE CREEK, SOUTH CAROLINA, BY CHANGING THE ZONING CLASSIFICATION OF THE PROPERTY LOCATED AT 128 HOWE HALL ROAD (TMS # 252-01-03-007) FROM CONSERVATION/OPEN SPACE DISTRICT (CO) TO GENERAL COMMERCIAL DISTRICT (GC) - (Second and Final Reading of a Public Hearing)

Mayor Habib stated this property was annexed into the City with its existing use but was brought in during a time when anything annexed came in immediately as Conservation Open Space. He stated there is a storage unit on this property that pre-exits its annexation and the owner will not be changing its use.

Motion: Councilmember Enos; Second: Mayor Pro Tem Tekac Discussion: None. Carried: All ayes.

b. AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE "CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF GOOSE CREEK, SOUTH CAROLINA", BY AMENDING TITLE XV - LAND USAGE, SUBCHAPTER "ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS SECTION 151.173(B)(1) - MEETINGS", AND SUBCHAPTER "ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW BOARD SECTION 151.190(F)(6) -MEETINGS" BY REMOVING ANY REFERENCES TO THE START TIME FOR THEIR RESPECTIVE MEETINGS - (Second and Final Reading of a Public Hearing)

Mayor Habib stated this would allow the Architectural Review Board and Zoning Board of Appeals to set their own start time of their meetings as opposed to City Council setting their time.

Motion: Councilmember Green-Fletcher; Second: Councilmember McSwain Discussion: None. Carried: All ayes.

c. AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF GOOSE CREEK, SOUTH CAROLINA, TO PROVIDE FOR CHANGES TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE BY REPEALING IN ITS ENTIRETY THE CURRENT CHAPTER 152. SMALL WIRELESS FACILITIES AND REPLACING IT WITH A NEW CHAPTER 152. STANDARDS FOR PLACEMENT OF SMALL WIRELESS FACILITIES - (Second and Final Reading of a Public Hearing)

Mayor Habib stated the Municipal Association of South Carolina updated its model ordinance with some changes, the original one was passed several years ago and before City Council is an updated version.

Motion: Councilmember Enos; Second: Councilmember Cox Discussion: None. Carried: All ayes.

d. AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GOOSE CREEK, SOUTH CAROLINA, BY AMENDING THE TITLE TO CHAPTER 92, STREETS, SIDEWALKS, AND OTHER PUBLIC PROPERTY; AND BY ADDING A NEW SUBSECTION (D), UNDERGROUND DISTRICT - (Second and Final Reading of a Public Hearing) Mayor Habib stated the proposed Ordinance is in response to the Municipal Association of South Carolina's update to the model ordinance relative to the small wireless facilities, which creates an underground district, which again, allows the City to manage where, when, and how wireless units are erected.

Motion: Councilmember McSwain; Second: Mayor Pro Tem Tekac Discussion: None. Carried: All ayes.

VI. <u>NEW BUSINESS & PUBLIC HEARINGS</u>

a. AN ORDINANCE DECLARING A MORATORIUM ON THE ISSUANCE OF NEW BUSINESS LICENSES, PERMITS FOR EXPANSION, AND/OR CERTIFICATES OF OCCUPANCY FOR USED AUTOMOBILE-VEHICLE SALES AND/OR REPAIR-SERVICE SHOPS IN CERTAIN AREAS OF THE CITY OF GOOSE CREEK -(Introduction and First Reading of a Public Hearing)

Mayor Habib stated the moratorium is for one (1) year in our incentive zones on used car dealerships and automotive repair service shops and it will give the City time to create an overlay district and to update the City's Zoning Codes to create a better opportunity for development.

Motion: Councilmember McClary; Second: Councilmember Enos

Discussion: Councilmember Cox stated she wanted to make sure this would not interfere with any new car dealerships opening a business, even if they also sell used cars and have a service center. Mrs. Zeigler stated that was correct, if the primary use is new cars, they could still have used cars and a service center. Councilmember Cox stated her 2nd concern was that anyone who has already started the process with business licensing and permitting would still be able to proceed. Mrs. Zeigler stated if they have already begun the process, they would not be denied.

Amended Motion: Councilmember Cox stated with her third concern, she wished to amend the motion to the proposed Ordinance to exclude the former Cadillac dealership located at, 208 South Goose Creek Boulevard (TMS#: 243-16-01-048), she believes it should remain a dealership, but she would like to specifically exempt them from the proposed Ordinance; Second: Councilmember McClary

Discussion: Councilmember McSwain inquired if Councilmember Cox had an explanation as to why she wished to leave the property as a car dealership. Councilmember Cox stated it was a prime location for a car dealership, it is next to Stokes Kia which makes sense, it would not restrict it from becoming a restaurant or anything. Councilmember McSwain stated maybe it should be included just so they have time to thing about it further. Mayor Pro Tem Tekac stated he was not in favor of a moratorium restricting property owners rights and while he understands there are twenty-one (21) of those types of properties within the zone in question, however, most of those are small business owners trying to put food on the table and he would prefer to see a design standard put in place sooner, rather than later.

Motion to the Amendment Carried: Six (6) in favor, one (1) opposed (Mayor Pro Tem Tekac).

Discussion on the original motion continued. Councilmember Enos stated, as a business owner, she didn't believe anyone would want to stop business or hinder anyone's rights. She stated she wished to make it clear this is just a twelve (12) month halt so they can move the City in the intended direction, as laid out in the Comprehensive Plan that was approved by City Council. Mayor Habib stated this was a call for revitalization, as well as an opportunity to create and sell the opportunity for success in those areas. Original Motion Carried: Six (6) in favor, one (1) opposed (Mayor Pro Tem Tekac).

b. AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF GOOSE CREEK, SOUTH CAROLINA BY REVISING AND MAKING CHANGES TO CHAPTER 37 ELECTIONS, SECTION 37.03 WHEN ELECTIONS TO BE HELD - (Introduction and First Reading of a Public Hearing)

Mayor Habib stated there is an amendment prepared for the proposed Ordinance that would make the

change in future elections following 2022, and it is sort of the original plan they had come up with and they will present the amendment.

Motion: Councilmember Cox; Second: Councilmember Enos

Amended Motion: Mayor Pro Tem Tekac made an amended Motion he would like to present the amendment to the proposed Ordinance. He stated he would like to make an amended motion to add this section "To facilitate the implementation of the amendment set forth above in Section 2, the public officials previously elected in November 2020 will serve until their successors are elected and qualified pursuant to an election in November 2025, and in a consistent manner, the public officials to be elected in November 2022 will serve until their successors are election in November 2027. Should any vacancy occur prior to these dates, the elected successor shall serve the remainder of the term of the official they are replacing."; Second: Councilmember Cox.

Discussion on the Amended Motion: Councilmember McSwain stated she was against moving the City's elections to an odd year. She stated in the last workshop she offered up a suggestion to hold a Referendum in 2022 to leave it up to the voters as to whether or not they would like to have their elections on even or odd number years.

Motion to the Amendment Carried: Five (5) ayes; Two (2) nays (Councilmembers McSwain and McClary).

Discussion on the original Motion: Councilmember Cox stated this is a suggested and model Ordinance that came from the Municipal Association of South Carolina. She stated in the state of South Carolina there are approximately seventy-four (74%) of municipalities that have adopted at least an odd year election cycle; and currently the City of Goose Creek is in the thirteenth (13%) percentile of municipalities who adopted an even year November general election cycle. Councilmember Cox stated every municipality that is larger than the City of Goose Creek has already adopted this change. Mayor Pro Tem Tekac stated when elections are held during Presidential elections, the voice of municipal election candidates gets lost in the media and he would like to see votes not simply based off of name recognition. Councilmember McClary stated he was opposed to the change from an odd number year because it would almost guarantee there will be less people voting.

Amended Motion: Councilmember McSwain made a motion to made to proposed Ordinance prospective for the next election cycles, 2022 and 2024, those candidates would fall into future odd election years thereafter (2027 and 2029); Second: Councilmember McClary.

Motion to the Amendment Failed: Two (2) ayes; Five (5) nays (Councilmember Tekac; Councilmember Enos; Councilmember Green-Fletcher; Mayor Habib)

Discussion on the Original Motion: Councilmember McClary stated the intent to move the elections from April to the November general elections was to increase voter turnout. Mayor Habib stated the vast majority of the municipalities in South Carolina and every large city in the United States are held in odd number years so there is local election time. He stated it allows for focus on municipal elections and the SC Election Commission, Municipal Association of SC and the National League of Cities wants this for municipal and local elections.

Original Motion Carried: Five (5) ayes; Two (2) nays (Councilmembers McSwain and Councilmember McClary)

c. AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 33: CITY ORGANIZATIONS, CULTURAL ARTS COMMISSION, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES FOR THE CITY OF GOOSE CREEK, SOUTH CAROLINA, BY REPEALING IN ITS ENTIRETY SECTION 33.102 COMPOSITION AND FUNCTIONS AND AOPTING IN LIEU THEREOF A NEW SECTION 33.102 COMPOSITION AND FUNCTIONS, WHICH IS MADE A PART HEREOF AS IS FULLY SET OUT HEREIN - (Introduction and First Reading of a Public Hearing)

Mayor Habib stated the proposed Ordinance would open up participation on the Cultural Arts Commission to those who live in the Recreation District.

Motion: Councilmember Cox; Second: Councilmember Enos

Discussion: Councilmember McSwain made a motion to amend the proposed Ordinance to change shall to may where it states "two (2) may be citizens of the Goose Creek Recreation Special Purpose Tax District, and who shall be appointed by City Council to serve two-year terms at the pleasure of City Council."; Seconded: Cox. Discussion: None. Carried: All ayes.

Discussion on Original Motion: None. Carried: All ayes.

VII. ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

a. Approval of Records Retention Schedule – Fire/EMS Department – (COVID-19 Vaccination Records) – City Clerk

Mrs. Zeigler presented a request for approval of a new Records Retention Schedule pertaining to COVID-19 Vaccination Records, retaining them for three (3) years before destroying.

Motion: Councilmember McSwain; Second: Councilmember Enos Discussion: None. Carried: All ayes.

VIII. <u>MAYOR'S REPORT</u>

Mayor Habib stated he appreciated the discussions that evening and the fact that they do not always agree. He stated these discussions were not the first-time specific items have come up, that they were discussed in City Council Workshops. Mayor Habib announced the upcoming Kids Fest on August 7th for back-to-school celebrations. He mentioned how successful the July Fourth in the Creek was and that approximately 6,000 people attended; and August 3rd is National Night Out (Note: Due to inclement weather, the date was changed to October 5th.); the first Movie Night for the year is schedule in August; and, he provided an update for the SC Department of Transportation project on St. James Avenue, as well as the landscaping that will be planted in those medians in the near future, as well as the Goose Creek banners that will be going up along those medians. He also mentioned the selling of banners to honor veterans in and around the City in honor of Veterans Day and the John McCants Veterans Park.

III. BUSINESS ITEMS

a. Presentation from LMWA - Brian Lynch, Sr. Manager - Environmental Resources & Water Resources

Mr. Lynch provided City Council with a presentation of the Lake Moultrie Water Agency, its current stats, and future projections with regard to gallons used, budget, capital projects and a modeling study. Mr. Lynch thoroughly answered all of City Council's questions.

b. Presentation - John Putney, PE - Mungo Homes, Land Development Manager

Mr. Putney provided City Council with a presentation of a home development project. Mungo Homes is looking at starting in the heart of Goose Creek off of Old Moncks Corner Road. Mr. Putney provided City Council with a tentative plan layout, description of the one-story style of homes and thoroughly answered all of their questions.

c. U-turn Ordinance (Police Chief Roscoe)

Chief Roscoe briefed City Council of the current City Ordinance, §70.29 states it is illegal to make a U-turn. She stated this is in direct contradiction to South Carolina State Law and with regard to what the City is doing with the St. James project and that South Carolina State Law allows for U-turns unless there is a sign that states otherwise. She stated the new ordinance will read upturns are allowed unless there is a sign prohibiting them.

d. Eubanks Park Plan (Rick McMackin, The LandPlan Group)

Mr. McMackin, of The LandPlan Group, presented City Council with the layout of the design build project of the park projected to include: inclusive playground (2-5 years old); inclusive playground (5-12 years old); 2 – 20x20 pavilions at playgrounds; splash pad; ship model; sand volleyball court; basketball court; covered pavilion/pickleball court; covered stage; restroom buildings; food truck court with shade sails. Background Summary			
With the recently adopted Comprehensive Plan, and current evaluation of a new zoning code and area specific overlay districts, the moratorium will permit time to establish desirable minimum standards, where the use will be permitted, for used automobile - other vehicle sales and/or repair shops. The moratorium would be applicable only within the two areas that City Council has previously designated as incentive areas - with the goal to attract such uses as full-service restaurants, retail, tourism businesses, cultural arts activities, research and development, technology companies, etc. The Zoning Administrator has expressed concerns relative to the potential for a concentration or proliferation of automobile centric uses in the incentive areas as an impediment to balanced commercial development and betterment of the area. Records indicate approximately the following number of specific business uses in the subject area: (21) auto related; (4) liquor (2) beer-tobacco specific; (2) e-cigarette- vape; (2) title loan. Staff recommends only the auto-centric uses be part of the moratorium at this time.

AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE DECLARING A MORATORIUM ON THE ISSUANCE OF NEW BUSINESS LICENSES, PERMITS FOR EXPANSION, AND/OR CERTIFICATES OF OCCUPANCY FOR USED AUTOMOBILE-VEHICLE SALES AND/OR REPAIR-SERVICE SHOPS IN CERTAIN AREAS OF THE CITY OF GOOSE CREEK.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council passed a new Comprehensive Plan in May 2021, and are currently working on options for a new or amended Zoning Ordinance and corridor specific development-redevelopment overlay districts; and,

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council are concerned about development use compatibility and a concentration and proliferation of automobile-vehicle centric uses as an impediment to balanced commercial development, and would like time to establish desirable minimum standards; and,

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council believe it is in the best interest of the City to now so act to provide good planning and zoning practices, and to provide for better guidance for orderly development.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED and ordered by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Goose Creek, South Carolina:

Section 1. MORATORIUM. The City of Goose Creek hereby declares a moratorium on the issuance of new business licenses, permits for expansion, and/or certificates of occupancy for used automobile-vehicle sales and/or repair-service shops in the basic and super incentive areas, excluding 208 S. Goose Creek Boulevard (TMS# 243-16-01-048), that have been previously designated by City Council – generally, the corridors of Red Bank Road, and portions of N/S Goose Creek Boulevard, and St. James Avenue. This moratorium shall take effect as established in Section 4 and shall remain in effect until July 29, 2022, with an option for a six-month extension. If Council adopts amendments to the Zoning Ordinance addressing standards and conditions for used automobile-vehicle sales and/or repair-service shops before the end date, the moratorium shall expire.

Section 2. Severability. Severability is intended throughout and within the provisions of this Ordinance. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, then that decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

Section 3. Repeal. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance, or inconsistent with its provisions, are hereby repealed or superseded to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

Section 4. Effective Date. This Ordinance is subject to the pending ordinance doctrine and is effective upon its introduction and notice of Public Hearing.



AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 37: ELECTIONS OF THE CITY OF GOOSE CREEK, SOUTH CAROLINA CODE OF ORDINANCES BY REVISING AND MAKING CHANGES TO THE FOLLOWING SECTION: 37.03 WHEN ELECTIONS TO BE HELD

WHEREAS, the City of Goose Creek, South Carolina (the "City"), acting through City Council of the City of Goose Creek (the "City Council"), is a municipal corporation of the State of South Carolina located in Berkeley County, South Carolina, and as such possesses all general powers granted by the Constitution and statutes of the State to such public entities;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 5-15-50 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, as amended, a municipality is authorized to establish by ordinance the time for the general elections of the municipality;

WHEREAS, in Willis v. Wukela, 379 S.C. 126 (2008), the South Carolina Supreme Court confirmed that "[a] municipality may hold elections, primary or otherwise, whenever it wishes;"

WHEREAS, the South Carolina Attorney General's office has acknowledged that changing election dates would affect the terms of office of incumbent officials and has opined that this exercise of power is permissible so long as it is reasonable and for a public purpose (see 2005 WL 3463712 (SCAG));

WHEREAS, to determine if a municipality reasonably exercised its authority to change municipal election dates, and thereby incumbent terms, the Attorney General's office suggested a court may consider factors including the length of the term extensions and the reasons for the term extension (see 2003 WL 21471512 (SCAG));

WHEREAS, the Executive Director of the State Elections Commission in a MASC Uptown Article from April 2020 stated that holding municipal general elections along with a federal general election means the municipal election appears at the bottom of the ballots resulting in a drop off in the number of voters casting ballots in those races;

WHEREAS, the Municipal Association of South Carolina and the State Elections Commission recommend municipalities in South Carolina adopt a standardized date for municipal general elections, and, for the reasons stated herein, suggest the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of odd-numbered years as such date (the "Municipal Election Date");

WHEREAS, the majority of municipalities in South Carolina have adopted the recommended Municipal Election Date including Charleston, Greenville, North Charleston, Columbia, and only 34 municipalities in South Carolina, including the City, hold municipal general elections in November of even-numbered years;

WHEREAS, City Council has determined it is reasonable to extend the terms of incumbent public officials by approximately one year in order to achieve the public purpose of increasing voter participation in municipal general elections, and City Council accordingly seeks to change the date of its municipal general elections;

WHEREAS, to facilitate a change in date of municipal general elections from November of even-numbered years to the recommended Municipal Election Date of the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of odd-numbered years, in accordance with Article XVII, Section 11 of the Constitution of the State of South Carolina 1895, as amended, the City Council will "hold their respective offices until their terms have expired and until their successors are elected [...] and qualified" following municipal general elections to be held in November of 2025 and November of 2027; and

WHEREAS, in order to accomplish these purposes, the City Council now desires, through the enactment of this Ordinance, to revise the City's Code of Ordinances (the "Code") as set forth herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED and ordered by the Mayor and City Council, in a meeting duly assembled, as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> Each finding or statement of fact set forth in the recitals hereto has been carefully examined and has been found to be in all respects true and correct and shall serve as the basis for the actions taken herein.

<u>Section 2.</u> By and through the enactment of this Ordinance Title III, Chapter 37, Section 37.03 of the Code, shall be amended to read, in its entirety, as follows:

§ 37.03 WHEN ELECTIONS TO BE HELD.

After the November 2022 municipal general election, and for every municipal general election for Mayor and City Council thereafter, the municipal general election shall be held on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November of odd-numbered years and if there be any postponement of the general election as a result of emergency or disaster, then at such time as the general election is held.

<u>Section 3.</u> To facilitate the implementation of the amendment set forth above in Section 2, the public officials previously elected in November 2020 will serve until their successors are elected and qualified pursuant to an election in November 2025, and in a consistent manner, the public officials to be elected in November 2022 will serve until their successors are elected and qualified pursuant to an election in November 2027. Should any vacancy occur prior to these dates, the elected successor shall serve the remainder of the term of the official they are replacing.

<u>Section 4.</u> If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held or determined to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

<u>Section 5.</u> Nothing in this Ordinance hereby enacted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding impending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, or any cause of causes of action acquired or existing, under any act or ordinance hereby repealed; nor shall any just or legal right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired or affected by this Ordinance.

<u>Section 6.</u> All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict or inconsistency. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its enactment by the Council.

WHEREAS, the City of Goose Creek's ordinances currently provide for municipal elections to be held on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November in each even numbered year;

WHEREAS, the Municipal Association of South Carolina and the State Elections Commission, recommend creating a Municipal Election Day in South Carolina;

WHEREAS, the City of Goose Creek, South Carolina (the "*City*"), acting through City Council of the City of Goose Creek (the "*City Council*"), is a municipal corporation of the State of South Carolina located in Berkeley County, South Carolina, and as such possesses all general powers granted by the Constitution and statutes of the State to such public entities;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 5-15-50 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, as amended, a municipality is authorized to establish by ordinance the time for the general elections of the municipality;

WHEREAS, to facilitate a change in date of municipal <u>general</u> elections from November of even-<u>numbered</u> years to the recommended Municipal Election <u>Day-Date</u> of the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of odd-years, the Mayor and Council members elected in 2020 will serve-<u>numbered</u> years, in accordance with Article XVII, Section 11 of the Constitution of the State of South Carolina 1895, as amended, the City Council will "hold their respective offices until their terms have expired and until their successors are sworn in as a result of the election <u>elected</u> [...] and qualified" following municipal general elections to be held in November of 2025. The Council members elected in 2018 will serve until their successors are sworn in after the election held in November 2023. Should any vacancy occur prior to these dates, the elected successor shall serve the remainder of the term of the official they are replacing. and November of 2027; and

WHEREAS, in order to accomplish these purposes, the City Council now desires, through the enactment of this Ordinance, to revise the City's Code of Ordinances (the "*Code*") as set forth <u>herein.</u>

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED and ordered by the Mayor and City Councilthe City of Goose Creek, South Carolina, in Council, in a meeting duly assembled, that the Code of Ordinances of the City of Goose Creek, South Carolina, shall be and are hereby amended as follows:

Section 37.03 governing when elections shall be held shall be deleted in its entirety and in its place the following section shall appear:

Section 1. Each finding or statement of fact set forth in the recitals hereto has been carefully examined and has been found to be in all respects true and correct and shall serve as the basis for the actions taken herein.

Section 2. By and through the enactment of this Ordinance Title III, Chapter 37, Section 37.03 of the Code, shall be amended to read, in its entirety, as follows:

§ 37.03 WHEN ELECTIONS TO BE HELD.

The After the November 2022 municipal general election, and for every municipal general election for Mayor and City Council thereafter, the municipal general election for Mayor and Council shall be held on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November in odd of odd-numbered years and if there be any postponement of the general election as a result of emergency or disaster, then at such time as the general election is held.

Section 3. To facilitate the implementation of the amendment set forth above in Section 2, the public officials previously elected in November 2020 will serve until their successors are elected and qualified pursuant to an election in November 2025, and in a consistent manner, the public officials to be elected in November 2022 will serve until their successors are elected and qualified pursuant to an election in November 2027. Should any vacancy occur prior to these dates, the elected successor shall serve the remainder of the term of the official they are replacing.

All ordinances and provisions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, and if any sentence, clause, phrase or word contained herein shall be held invalid, such invalidity <u>Section 4.</u> If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held or determined to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remainder remaining portions of this ordinance. Ordinance.

Section 5. Nothing in this Ordinance hereby enacted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding impending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, or any cause of causes of action acquired or existing, under any act or ordinance hereby repealed; nor shall any just or legal right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired or affected by this Ordinance.

Section 6. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict or inconsistency. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its enactment by the Council.

WHEREAS, in an effort to open recruiting for commission members to the Cultural Arts Commission, the Mayor and City Council are including the citizens of the Goose Creek Recreation Special Purpose Tax District.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED and ordered by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Goose Creek, South Carolina, in Council duly assembled, that the current Section 33.102 Composition and Functions, is hereby repealed and replaced with the following code section and is hereby adopted as follows:

Section 33.102 Composition and Functions

The Cultural Arts Commission shall consist of seven (7) members, of which five (5) shall be citizens of the City and two (2) may be citizens of the Goose Creek Recreation Special Purpose Tax District, and who shall be appointed by City Council to serve two-year terms at the pleasure of City Council. The terms commence on the day of the appointment and continue for two (2) years or until City Council appoints a replacement.

Relationship to Comprehensive Plan

The newly created Comprehensive Plan Future Land Use Map shows this area as Medium Density Residential. The current zoning for this area is (RC) Restricted Commercial, providing a good transitional zoning from General Commercial to Residential. A residential day care is not inconsistent with this land use.

Staff Comments

The subject property currently is a vacant .22 acre parcel west of the property currently identified as 107 Etling Av. 107 Etling Av. is currently a 29-bed assisted living facility known as Quality Care Residential Home SC, LLC. The applicant would like to join these two parcels together, rezone this parcel (RC) Restricted Commercial, and abandon the property line creating one larger parcel. This would allow the owner to build an additional eight (8) rooms onto the current 29-bed assisted living facility. A portion of the additional parcel would be used to meet additional parking requirements as outlined in the City Zoning Code of Ordinances. Therefore, the applicant is requesting to rezone the parcel from (R2) Medium Density Single-Family Residential to (RC) Restricted Commercial.

There currently is a residence, located to the West, with no development to the North. The parcel to the south is located in the City, owned by the applicant, and is currently zoned RC) Restricted Commercial. Properties to the East are commercial in nature and extend as such out to St. James Av.

Staff recommends this rezone request.



WHEREAS, the City of Goose Creek's current section of the Code of Ordinances on U Turns is in direct contradiction to the state of South Carolina's Code of Laws Section 56-5-2120 Required Position and Method of Turning (d) (2); and Section 56-5-2140 Limitations on turning around (a) (b); and,

WHEREAS, the purpose of this ordinance is to make Section 70.29 "U" Turns of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Goose Creek consistent with South Carolina State Law; and


Crimes Against Persons, This Year versus Last Year



ACTIVITY CENTER PROGRAMS

- <u>Aerobics:</u> 12 classes offered per week, 7 Easy Does it classes offered per week, Zumba classes offered 3 times a week, Ball Fit is offered 2 times a week and Werq is also a good workout. Spin classes have been added to offer a variety to participants. A monthly schedule is out with specific dates and times.
- <u>Art Classes</u>: Art classes are offered for adults and kids. Each class has a different theme. Days and times of classes can be found on our website.
- <u>Dance</u>: Ages 3 & up learn tap, ballet and jazz and put on a recital in May. Hip Hop classes are also offered on Monday afternoons from 4:30 PM to 5:30 PM.
- <u>Gymnastics/Tumbling/Cheernastics</u>: Playnastics is a fun time for ages 6 months to 7 year olds. Classes are held Monday and Wednesdays from 10:00am to 12:00pm. The cost is \$5 per child for residents and \$7 per child for nonresidents. There are several classes for all ages. See our website for all class times and dates.
- <u>Martial Arts</u>: Classes are held on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays for all levels starting at age 4. First class is a free trial class.
- <u>Preschool</u>: Preschool will consist of 3-5 year olds in our Half Pints class. This class will be Monday through Friday from 8:30am-11:00a. The school program runs from September to May and follows the Berkeley County School District holiday schedule.
- <u>**Yoga**</u>: Classes are offered on Monday through Thursday for all different levels. The website will show all the levels and times offered.

COMMUNITY CENTER PROGRAMS

- **<u>Fitness Memberships:</u>** Adult and Youth Memberships are available. Residents are \$60 for an adult and \$25 for youth for a year. Nonresidents pay \$325 adult and \$175 for a youth membership per year.
- <u>Personal Training</u>: Orientation, Personal Training from 3 certified instructors, and Strength training for teens.
- <u>Senior Walking Club:</u> This club is for seniors 60 and older. They receive a colored membership card that does not need to be scanned in. This membership runs a calendar year. Residents pay \$25 for a year and nonresidents pay \$100 for a year. The days and hours that they can walk is Monday Friday 12:30 PM to 2:30 PM.
