Mayor Habib called the meeting to order at 6:02 pm and requested Councilmember McClary to lead in the invocation and Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Habib recognized residents from the audience who voiced their concerns about a proposed new housing development on Old Moncks Corner Road and noise issues relating to JW Aluminum.

### V. <u>OLD BUSINESS & PUBLIC HEARINGS</u>

a. AN ORDINANCE TO RAISE REVENUE AND ADOPT A BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF GOOSE CREEK, SOUTH CAROLINA, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JANUARY 1, 2022 AND ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2022 (Second and Final Reading of a Public Hearing)

Mayor Habib stated within the proposed budget the City would be including the purchase of two (2) new fire trucks, a senior planner; an additional community policing officer; increase in payroll and there will be a millage rate increase.

Mayor Habib stated there will be a water rate increase of 10% this year and 5% for each additional year for the next four (4) years. He stated it is imperative that water sales pay for its operations, which currently is not done, and this will help prevent the need for loans when improvements are needed to the water system.

Mayor Habib stated the proposed Ordinance is in accordance with the Municipal Association of South Carolina's model Business Licensing Ordinance and it was something that came down through the SC Legislature to make business licensing common and easier for business owners across the state to do business with government entities.

Mayor Habib stated the proposed Ordinance has returned to the Agenda from several months ago. Mayor Habib stated proposed amendment would make this Ordinance effective following the 2022 election, it would extend the terms of those elected in 2020 to 2025; and then in 2022 those running would be elected to a five (5) year term. He stated the idea is to get us in line with the recommendations of the Municipal Association of South Carolina and the Election Commission of South Carolina and to move to an odd year municipal election day.

Councilmember McSwain, Councilmember Enos and Councilmember Cox all recused themselves from the vote.

### § 151.129 RESTRICTED COMMERCIAL DISTRICT.

- (A) Purpose.
- (1) To develop and reserve a quiet, uncongested office-type environment primarily for business and professional firms (reference commercial);
- (2) To discourage encroachment by unrestricted commercial or wholesale businesses, industries or other uses adversely affecting the specialized district character;
- (3) To discourage business uses which require outside display of merchandise, equipment or materials (particularly miscellaneous goods, used items or items not packaged or generally presenting a neat uniform appearance), except as allowed in the zoning permit, or approved by the Zoning Administrator; and
  - (4) To encourage the discontinuance of nonconforming areas.
  - (B) Permitted uses. The following are approved uses by right.
    - (1) Residential uses.
      - (a) Customary home occupations (as defined in §151.028).
      - (b) Detached single-family dwelling.
      - (c) Duplex and two-family dwellings.
- (d) Watchman's or caretaker's dwelling located on the premises with the permitted use, and occupied by a company employee.
- (e) Nursing home or extended care facility not offering outpatient or medical services for a fee.
  (2) Religious uses. Places of worship located on major thoroughfares or collector streets, subject to zone minimum setback standards.
  - (3) Educational uses.
    - (a) Licensed nursery or preschool facility.
- (b) Public library or museum, provided no structure is located within 30 feet of property boundaries on a minimum two acre site.
- (c) Public/private school (not trade or business) on a minimum five acre site, and no structure or parking within 50 feet of property boundaries.
  - (4) Recreational uses.
    - (a) Country club, tennis club, swimming club, or golf course, provided no lighting impacts on adjacent uses.
    - (b) Private recreation facility of at least two acres, with no structure located within 30 feet of property boundaries.
- (c) Public recreation facility, provided no structure is located within 30 feet of boundaries, and no overnight storage of vehicles/equipment.
- (d) Semi-public club, lodge, union hall or social center, provided no residential or commercial activity is conducted on the premises.
  - (5) Office, governmental, institutional uses.
    - (a) Any publicly-owned facility, building or land.
- (b) Business office for services specific to a profession such as an attorney, accountant, advertising agency, financial consultant, real estate, and the like.
- (c) Governmental, business, professional or general purpose office, excluding storage, repair, or rental of equipment on premises.
- (d) Office for professional or administrative support services such as word processing, printing, computer graphics, and the like.
  - (e) Professional healthcare offices such as medical, dental, chiropractic offices, and the like.
  - (f) Public transportation terminal/passenger facility.
- (g) Public utility substation installed in compliance with buffer and screening requirements, and fenced to control access.
  - (h) Railroad rights-of-way, excluding all facilities other than those required for track operations.
  - (6) Commercial uses.
  - (a) Arts, crafts, or dance studio; art gallery.

- (b) Emergency medical care facility.
- (c) Enterprise rendering a personal or business service, or restricted retail activity (as defined in §151.028) in a specific product category.
  - (d) Hospital.
  - (e) Nursing home or extended care facility offering outpatient or medical services for a fee.
  - (f) Radio/television station or studio (excluding transmission towers).
  - (g) Specialty shops such as a florist, news stand, gift shop, or boutique.
  - (h) Veterinary clinic/animal hospital without boarding facilities.
  - (C) Lot, yard, height and coverage. These requirements are illustrated inAppendix D.
  - (D) Accessory uses. Accessory uses, as defined in §151.028, are permitted as illustrated in Appendix C.
  - (E) Temporary uses. Temporary uses as defined in § 151.028 and with prior approval of the Zoning Administrator.
  - (F) Conditional uses. The following uses may be approved uses by a conditional use permit.
    - (1) Cemetery (permanent barrier/screening wall required).
- (2) Combination commercial/residential structure not over four stories, provided no dwellings on first floor and all dwellings have street access.
  - (3) Hotel or tourist home.
- (4) Multi-family dwellings, apartments, including garden apartments, townhouses, patio homes, and the like. (1985 Code, Art. VII, § 704) (Ord. 16-009, passed 6-14-2016)







### AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GOOSE CREEK, SOUTH CAROLINA PROVIDING FOR LARGE OUTDOOR EVENTS ON PROPERTY NOT OWNED OR CONTROLLED BY THE CITY, WHICH IS ATTACHED HERETO AND MADE PART HEREOF AS IS FULLY SET OUT HEREIN

WHEREAS, the City of Goose Creek seeks to promote a hometown community, with a hometown feel and hometown pride, and

WHEREAS, special events are occasions that bring the community together to socialize, make memories, and celebrate our shared hometown experience, and

WHEREAS, the City's abundance of talented artists, musicians and active residents enrich many of its special events, and

WHEREAS, a City's special events increase the enjoyment and quality of its residents' lives, and

WHEREAS, the City wishes to create an environment conducive for such events by the creation of a special event ordinance, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED and ordered by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Goose Creek, South Carolina, in Council duly assembled, that the City of Goose Creek, South Carolina, hereby adopt an ordinance to provide for large outdoor events on property not owned or controlled by the City, which is attached hereto and made part hereof as is fully set out herein.

<u>Section 1</u> Permit and compliance required; owner and occupant responsibility.

No person, organization or other entity shall sponsor or knowingly permit a large outdoor event, as defined in section 2, without first obtaining a permit from the City in accordance with the provisions of this article. No person having received such a permit shall conduct or allow to be conducted a large outdoor event without complying with the terms of the permit. No property owner, tenant or other lawful occupant of the premises shall provide a written authorization for the large event without also taking all reasonable steps and precautions within the scope of their authority over the property to ensure the sponsor's compliance with this article.

### Section 2 Definitions.

The following words, terms, and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Director means the Finance Director, or such other person as the City Administrator shall designate, to exercise the City's duties, responsibilities, and authority under this article.

Large outdoor event means any performance, party, dinner, sale or like occurrence, except as listed in "exclusions" in section 3 which:

- (1) Is held outside in a parking lot, field, lawn, driveway or like area which is not contained within a permanent improvement having a roof supported by enclosing walls, lattices or other upright structural configuration; and
- (2) Has or reasonably should be anticipated as having 250 or more members of the public at large in attendance at any one time during the occurrence; and
- (3) Is open to members of the public at large.

Open to members of the public at large means attendance is extended and granted to any person or group of persons who by virtue of paying an admission fee, entrance fee, cover charge or like payment without regard to having known or had prior dealings with the promoter, sponsor, owner, lessee, or manager of the premises or of the event. The term "open to members of the public at large" includes events for which no such charge is made, but which is advertised, promoted, or sponsored in association with or in collaboration with an organized convention, conference, or other assemblage for which there is a registering process that is advertised and promoted by radio, television, printed publication, mail outs, mass emailing or mass social media contact. The term "open to members of the public at large" also includes such events for which no such charge is made but which offers food, beverages or entertainment, or some combination of them, for payment.

### Section 3 Exclusions.

The provisions of this article do not apply to the following occurrences and circumstances:

- (1) Any event held inside a theater, church, school, assembly hall, arena, governmental council chamber or board meeting room, or like area within a structure and specifically designed to be used as a place for the assemblage of persons.
- (2) A private event to which written invitations have been extended to specific persons such as a wedding, anniversary party, nonprofit fund raiser, political reception or fund raiser for a candidate for public office or political party or similar occurrence for which invitations have been extended, even if there are attendees who did not receive an invitation; provided, however, a mass mailing or mass emailing, of promotional material to a customer list for what is primarily a commercial event shall not exclude the activity from coverage by this article.
- (3) Parades and other events occurring on City streets, parks, plazas, and other City-owned property for which are subject to the provisions of title VII, chapter 72.
- (4) Scheduled events held in a baseball stadium or football stadium with the consent and approval of the owner or manager of the facility.
- (5) Events which are held on the grounds of a school, place of worship, business, or nonprofit corporation and which are attended primarily by attendees of the school, place of worship, business, or nonprofit corporation.
- (6) Family reunions.

### <u>Section 4</u> Permit process; requirements.

- (a) The director shall prepare a permit application and develop a process for submitting, considering, and approving, approving with modifications and conditions, or denying applications which are timely submitted and complete; an application must be submitted no later than 30 days prior to the event. The process shall conform to the provisions of this article and may be supplemented for purposes of clarification and special conditions associated with the time, date, day of the week, location and comparable variables associated with an application.
- (b) No permit shall be granted to an applicant for a large outdoor event permit unless the applicant establishes with reasonable substantiation that provisions are in place to comply with the following:
  - (1) Location. The address of the location, as well as the name and relevant contact information of the owner and lawful occupant of the premises, and, where applicable, the name of the manager of the premises.
  - (2) Sponsor identity. The name of the sponsor or promoter of the event, who shall be the person capable of making decisions during the planning, preparation, operation, and cleanup of the event.
  - (3) Noise control. Evidence of workable plans to mitigate and limit the sound from the event so that the effects of excessive noise are minimized. Note: An approved large outdoor event is not exempt from the noise ordinance, unless the approved permit so specifies and then the permit must address the terms and conditions of noise control and may be revoked for failure to comply.
  - (4) Site plan. A reasonably accurate representation of the boundaries of the site and the location and character of uses of any property abutting the property on which the event is to occur; if vehicles are to be allowed within the site area, there must be a showing of safe ingress and egress routes as well as routes for safe internal circulation.
  - (5) Date, day of week and times. The date, day of the week and beginning time of the event as well as the date, day of the week and ending time of the event. No event may begin earlier than 8:00 a.m. absent a clear and convincing showing by the applicant for the earlier time, and the director may set reasonable limits upon the latest time for operation in view of the potential impact of the activity upon surrounding properties and their occupants, with special regard to any nearby residential uses.
  - (6) Toilets. A workable plan for the placement of useable public toilets in such numbers as to comply with at least one toilet for every 250 persons estimated to be in attendance and the most intensely attended portion of the event. If special circumstances require, the director may increase the number of toilets required.
  - (7) Toilet sanitation. Substantiation that the toilets will be in a clean, sanitary, functioning, and useable condition throughout the event in accordance with the standards used for special events on City property.
  - (8) Parking plan. A suitable parking plan, inclusive of staffing, to ensure orderly and reasonable parking where otherwise permitted by law and with the consent of property owners.
  - (9) Maintenance and cleanup. A workable plan for the control of solid waste during the event and a cleanup plan for after the event; at a minimum the plan must specify: the placing and size of solid waste receptacles for use by attendees, vendors, and other participants; the frequency of replacement or emptying the receptacles; the arrangements to reduce the likelihood of litter affecting nearby properties and rights-of-way; and the time and thoroughness of cleanup.

- (10) Monitoring and security. A description of the method by which there will be monitors of activity and crowd movement as well as security for the activity; at a minimum the description shall address the placement, duties, and authority of the personnel. Pursuant to S.C. Code § 23-31-520(A), if the open carry of firearms is prohibited at the event, the person or organization hosting the event must post signs at the event stating the prohibition of firearms during the event. The City must be advised at the time of application as to whether open carrying of firearms is going to be allowed or not allowed and the organizer cannot elect to change from open carry not allowed, to open carry allowed after the permit is granted.
- (11) Written authorization. A statement reduced to writing in a form acceptable to the reasonable satisfaction of the director by which both the owner of the property and the tenant or other lawful occupant affirm that they are aware of the program to be offered and that they authorize the occurrences.
- (12) Contacts for nearby occupants and owners. Substantiation that persons owning and occupying property within 500 feet of the site have been provided the name, telephone numbers and address of the sponsor of the event; the telephone numbers must include the sponsor's cell phone which must be operable during the event.

#### Section 5 Service of alcohol.

Any sponsor planning to serve beverages containing alcohol at a large outdoor event must disclose that fact on the permit application. All requisite state alcohol licenses and permits must be obtained and a copy provided to the director prior to the event. No service shall be allowed unless it is in conformity with state law. Failure to comply is a basis for immediate termination of the event.

#### Section 6 Bond.

A sponsor must post a bond with the City of \$500.00 for cleanup costs associated with public rights-of-way and public property located within 500 feet of the event site. If the City incurs no cleanup costs attributable to the event within 48 hours of the time the event ends, then the full amount will be returned promptly to the sponsor. If the city incurs personnel or other expenses for cleanup costs reasonably attributable to the event and determined within 48 hours, then the City may retain so much as needed for such costs and return the reminder. If the City during that time receives a complaint about damage and cleanup costs from the occupant or owner of other property within 48 hours of the event, and the complaint reasonably relates to conditions associated with the event, then the City reserves the right to retain possession of the full amount of the bond until it receives a signed release of claims from the complainant. Nothing in this section precludes either the City or the occupant or owner of property located within 500 feet of the event site of seeking additional damages from the event sponsor not covered by the bond.

#### Section 7 Other laws.

Compliance with the provisions of this article does not relieve the sponsor from complying with all other licensing and permitting requirements of the City, including business license, occupancy permits in the event stages or tents are utilized. Nor does such compliance relieve the sponsor from compliance with the fire code, traffic laws, parking requirements, sanitation provisions or any other municipal ordinance.

In accordance with § 110.001, a Business License is required when operating within the City of Goose Creek. All promoters and vendors are licensed individually unless a blanket business license has been issued; at the discretion of the Finance Director. The business license will be based on all promoter's fees and an estimation of gross revenue of all vendors of the event. All Federal, State and Local regulations are strictly applied.

#### Section 8 Compliance and enforcement.

All applicants for a large outdoor event permit shall make full disclosure of all material facts asked for on the application and known to them at the time of application. Failure to disclose fully is a separate violation in addition to any others arising under this article. The police and other personnel designated by the City Administrator to enforce this article are authorized to discontinue immediately a large outdoor event which has not been properly permitted or which fails to comply with the terms and conditions of the permit. Any sponsor or promoter of such an event shall be entitled to appeal the decision immediately by telephone or other comparable communication device to the City Administrator, or in his absence or unavailability, to the deputy City Administrator or other acting administrator, who may affirm, modify, or reverse the termination of the event. Persons convicted of a willful violation of this article shall be subject to the general penalties clause of this Code in §10-99.

All ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall be effective on the date of final reading.

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#### AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF GOOSE CREEK, SOUTH CAROLINA, BY REPEALING IN ITS ENTIRETY THE CURRENT CHAPTER 72; PARADES, PROCESSIONS, AND OTHER GATHERINGS AND ADOPTING IN LIEU THEREOF NEW CHAPTER 72; PARADES, EVENTS, BLOCK PARTIES, PERFORMANCES, FILMING, AND PICKETING PERMITS AND TO PROVIDE FOR A PROHIBITION OF THE OPEN CARRY OF FIREARMS DURING PICKETS AND OTHER PERMITTED EVENTS ON PUBLIC PROPERTY, WHICH IS ATTACHED HERETO AND MADE PART HEREOF AS IS FULLY SET OUT HEREIN

WHEREAS, as part of the newly enacted South Carolina Open Carry with Training Act, local governments have the authority to prohibit the open carry of firearms during permitted events taking place on public property, including during protests; and

WHEREAS, the City of Goose Creek (the City) has for time immemorial offered and allowed organized festivals, gatherings, and other special events on its sidewalks, streets, and public rights-of-way; and

WHEREAS, the organized events historically draw a wide range of attendees, including but not limited to families, residents, tourists, visitors, seniors, and students from all generations and all walks of life; and

WHEREAS, the City deems it in its best interest to exercise the authority given to it by state law to prohibit the open carrying of firearms during permitted events; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to amend Chapter 72 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Goose Creek to provide for the issuance of a permit for picketing activity within the scope of section 72.020, and further, to provide for a prohibition on the open carry firearms during pickets as expressly allowed by Section 23-31-520 of the South Carolina Code of Laws; and

WHEREAS, despite the creation of this ordinance, the right to peacefully protest remains squarely preserved; and

WHEREAS, the City believes this additional measure will serve to promote peace and good order during events and, further, recognizes the prohibition on open carry as described above is in keeping with City policy as it pertains to its own buildings and facilities where weapons are prohibited; and

WHEREAS, in order to accomplish the foregoing, City Council desires to amend Chapter 72 of the Code of Ordinance, which is incorporated herein by reference;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED and ordered by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Goose Creek, South Carolina, in Council duly assembled, that the City of Goose Creek, South Carolina, hereby repeal in its entirety the current Chapter 72 of the Code of Ordinances and adopt in lieu there of a new Chapter 72; Parades, Events, Block Parties, Performances, Filming, and Picketing Permits.

This article shall be known as the "Parade, Event, Block Party, Performance, Filming and Picketing Regulation Ordinance of the City of Goose Creek." It shall be applicable to parades, events, block

parties, performances, filming, and picketing conducted in whole or in part on property owned or controlled by the City, such as a property leased by the City, or any public street or right-of-way within the City.

#### § 72.002 Enforcement of other laws.

Nothing contained in this article shall prohibit the authority of any officer to arrest a person engaged in any act or activity granted under this article, if the conduct of such person violates the laws of the State, provisions of this Code, or other ordinances of the City, or unreasonably obstructs the public streets and sidewalks of the City, or if such person engages in acts that cause or would tend to cause a breach of the peace, or undue disturbance, interference, or molestation of other persons making lawful use of the space in a peaceful manner.

#### § 72.003 Definitions.

The following words, terms, and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Block party means a private outdoor gathering on a public street which involves the closure of a street and may include live or taped music and the distribution of food and beverages.

Event means any festival, concert or other announced public gathering upon any property owned or controlled by the City, such as a property leased by the City, or any public street or right-of-way within the City.

Filming means any filming of movies, commercials, documentaries and other motion pictures, video projects, or commercial photographs upon any public street, right-of-way, or property of the City.

Open event means any event which primarily promotes, entertainment, arts, dining, athletic competition, political activity and is generally advertised as open to the public at large without the necessity to enter by prior invitation or purchase of a ticket; events are presumed to be open events.

Parade means any parade, march, foot race, bicycle race, ceremony, pageant, or procession of any kind moving upon any public street or sidewalk of the City which does not comply with normal traffic regulations.

Performance means any public presentation, exhibition, fireworks display or appearance upon any public street, right-of-way, plaza, or property of the City.

Picketing and pickets include demonstrating and demonstrators, and other related First Amendment activity.

Private event means a wedding, commitment ceremony, fundraiser, block party in a residential neighborhood, and filming event; social activities requiring limited admission for sponsors or invited guests may be treated as private events; events requiring paid admission or tickets may be treated as private events; events involving a state, national, or international official who has special security details may be treated as a private event for the limited purpose of assuring security.

Street performance means acting, singing, playing one or more musical instruments, dancing, miming, juggling, unicycling, stilt walking, doing magic tricks, reciting, imitating statues, and engaging in similar acts of entertainment when done on a City -owned or -controlled sidewalk, plaza, park, or similar public space.

Street performer means someone who engages in street performances. § 72.004 Permit required; exceptions.

No person shall engage or participate in, aid, form or start any parade, event, block party, performance or filming unless a permit is obtained from the City Administrator. This section shall not apply to the following:

- (1) Funeral processions supervised by a licensed mortuary;
- (2) Picketing as permitted by City ordinance; or
- (3) A parade, event or performance hosted or sponsored by the City including the Recreation Department.

#### § 72.005 Application for permit.

- (a) Generally. A person seeking the issuance of a parade, event, block party, performance or filming permit shall file an application with the City. The application shall be filed not less than 30 days before the date on which the parade, event, block party, performance or filming is to be conducted. However, where good cause is shown, the City shall have the option to consider any application which is filed less than 30 days before the date sought.
- (b) Contents. The application shall be signed by the applicant, and shall include but not be limited to the following:
  - (1) The name, address and telephone number of the individuals or organizations seeking to conduct such parade, event, block party, performance or filming.
  - (2) The date when the proposed parade, event, block party, performance or filming is to be conducted;
  - (3) The route to be traveled, the starting point and the termination point, or the area sought to be used or closed off for the parade, event, block party, performance or filming;
  - (4) The approximate number of persons, animals and vehicles participating, and the types of animals and a description of the vehicles;
  - (5) The time when the parade, event, block party, performance or filming will start and terminate;
  - (6) The location, by streets, of any assembly area and the time of such assembly for parades; or the location of such street, plaza, park, or other public area where persons will gather for an event, ceremony, or performance for events other than parades;
  - (7) Provisions for sanitation facilities, crowd, noise and traffic control, security and parking as pertinent for the event;
  - (8) If vehicular access will be prevented to any home or business during their normal business hours for more than 15 minutes, proof of consent by the property owner to such interruption of vehicular access.
  - (9) A description of food and beverages to be sold or distributed, and if beverages containing alcohol are to be sold, then evidence of a state permit, if needed, having been issued or applied for, and a limitation of such beverages to beer and wine;
  - (10) Contacts for nearby occupants and owners. Substantiation that persons owning and occupying property within 500 feet of the site have been provided the name, telephone numbers and address of the sponsor of the event; the telephone numbers must include the cell phone of one or more persons who will have the ability to address potential problems with noise, traffic or other concerns during the event;
- § 72.006 Issuance of permit; conditions.
- (a) Criteria for issuance. The City shall issue a permit for a proposed parade, event, block party, performance or filming unless it finds that:
  - (1) The conduct of the parade, event, block party, performance or filming will substantially interrupt the safe and orderly movement of other traffic contiguous to its route including whether it will block any persons from being able to have vehicle access to their property without their advance consent;
  - (2) The conduct of the parade, event, block party, performance or filming will require the diversion of so great a number of police officers of the City to properly police the line of movement and of contiguous areas that adequate police protection cannot be provided to the remainder of the City;
  - (3) The concentration of persons, animals, equipment or vehicles at assembly points or other areas will substantially interfere with adequate fire and police protection of, or ambulance service to, areas near such areas, or will hinder the movement of firefighting equipment;
  - (4) The conduct of the parade, event, block party, performance or filming is reasonably likely to result in violence to persons or property, causing serious harm to the public;
  - (5) The route has been requested recurringly in the past year and is too disruptive to residents or businesses;
- (b) Liability insurance. The City shall require proof of liability insurance in an amount of at least the caps in the South Carolina Tort Claims Act and shall require the execution of an agreement to indemnify the City in the event of any claims arising from the event.

(c) Adequate cleanup and sanitation must be provided. All permits shall contain the implied condition that all areas shall be cleaned by the event applicant and the applicant shall be liable for any costs incurred by the City for additional cleaning activity.

#### § 72.007 Notice of action on application.

The Administration Department shall act upon the application for a permit required by this article as expeditiously as possible, notifying the applicant by mail of the decision. If the application is disapproved, the reasons therefor shall be set out in writing.

§ 72.008 Approval of permit under alternative date, time, route or conditions.

The City Administrator, in denying an application for a permit under this article, shall be empowered to authorize the conduct of the parade, event, block party, performance or filming on a date, at a time, or over a route and under different conditions from that requested by the applicant.

#### § 72.009 Duties of permittee.

- (a) Generally. A permittee under this article shall comply with all permit directions and conditions.
- (b) Display or carrying of permit. The applicant, individual, or any representative of the organization shall display the permit or carry it upon his person during the parade, event, performance or filming.
- (c) Special event vendor's permits. No event which features businesses or organizations providing goods or services for compensation shall be issued an event permit, unless the permittee under this article shall obtain for each such business or organization a special event vendor's permit from the City in accordance with such measures as the City Administrator shall prescribe. Each permittee must designate an individual who will be responsible for identifying all vendors and for collecting on behalf of the City all fees as provided in this section.

#### § 72.010 Public conduct.

- (a) Interference. No person shall unreasonably hamper, obstruct, impede or interfere with any parade, event, performance or filming, or with any person, vehicle or animal participating or used in the event.
- (b) Driving through parade or event. No driver of any vehicle shall drive between the vehicles or persons comprising a parade when such vehicles are in motion and are conspicuously designated as a parade, nor shall any driver drive around or through any event or a properly designated or barricaded area.
- (c) Parking on parade route or event location. The City shall have the authority to prohibit or restrict the parking of vehicles along a street or area properly designated or posted for a parade, event, performance or filming, and it shall be unlawful for any person to park or leave unattended any vehicle in violation thereof.
- (d) Glass containers. No glass bottle, containers or cans may be sold or distributed on the public right-of-way, and no patron may carry a glass bottle, container or can on the public right-of-way during a parade, event, performance, or filming. It shall be unlawful for any vendor to sell beverages in glass containers for off-premise consumption at parades or events.

#### § 72.011 Payment of costs of services and equipment provided by City.

The City may impose reasonable fees and requirements upon the applicant as are necessary to cover the cost of public services and equipment provided by the City for the event. The City may require the payment of the cost of public services including police, fire, or traffic officials in advance of the event. The applicant or sponsor shall be responsible for cleanup after an event. The City may require a cash bond to cover the cost of any additional expenses including but not limited to clean-up expenses. The amount of the bond may be set by the Administration Department to reflect the potential costs of potential future expenses. If the bond is insufficient, the applicant and sponsor shall be liable for the actual costs to the City, including clean-up, whether conducted by public employees or private contractors.

#### § 72.020 Picketing

(a) Conduct of picketing; penalty. For purposes of this section, picketing means an organized effort to express publicly a point of view at a given place with signs, oral statements, or the like in a systematic manner, which involves walking or standing in the same area for a prolonged period of time. Peaceful picketing in the furtherance of a lawful purpose shall be allowed in the City, provided the picketing is done under the following conditions:

- (1) Picketing may be conducted only on the sidewalks, on the grounds of a City-controlled park or plaza, or in other City-owned areas or rights-of-way normally used or reserved for pedestrian movement, and may not be conducted on the portion of a street used primarily for vehicular traffic.
- (2) Such picketers must have applied for and been issued a permit as required under subsection § 72.020(b).
- (3) Such picketers may carry written or printed signs (which such term shall be interpreted to include flags), provided the signs do not interfere with the free use of the sidewalk or rights-of-way by other pedestrians. Such signs, with reasonable use, shall be deemed to comply if they are composed of paper, cardboard, poster board, cloth, vinyl, or similarly non-rigid material; do not exceed 1/32 inches in thickness; do not exceed 20 inches by 30 inches or 600 square inches in the case of signs composed of paper, cardboard, poster board, or similar material; and do not exceed four feet by six feet in the case of signs composed of cloth, vinyl, or a similar material. Signs exceeding these dimensions are presumed threats to safety.
- (4) Such picketers on sidewalks or on right-of-way normally used or reserved for pedestrian movement must march or stand single file and not congregate so as to block any sidewalk, driveway, or business entrance. All laws pertaining to the orderly flow of pedestrians must be obeyed.
- (5) For public safety reasons, the following are prohibited in the immediate proximity of pickets, and due notice shall be included in every receipt of notice of intent to picket that these restrictions apply:
  - (i) Open flames and combustible solids;
  - (ii) Sticks, poles, selfie sticks, or other similar elongated solid objects capable of inflicting bodily harm as a striking or stabbing object, excluding commercially available corrugated cardboard tubing as the supporting article for signs, flags, and the like;
  - (iii) Backpacks, satchels, bags, coolers, or similar personally carried containers exceeding six inches by eight inches by three inches, except when said container is completely clear and see through;
  - (iv) Pursuant to S.C. Code Ann. § 23-31-520, the open care of any firearm;
  - (v) Any mechanical or handmade contrivance that launches any projectile of solid, liquid, or gaseous composition, including aerosols/pressurized canisters;
  - (vi) Any stabbing, cutting, slicing, or striking blade, whether of metal or other solid composition;
  - (vii) Any striking object, such as a bat, stick, brass knuckles, martial arts weapons, implement handles and the like, which would inflict bodily injury;
  - (viii) Any facial mask, headgear, or cloth worn over any portion of the face which prevents facial identification of a person 14 years of age or older;
  - (ix) Any carried object that resembles or serves the purpose of a shield;
  - (x) Any armor or defensive covering that resembles or serves the purpose of defensive body armor;
  - (xi) Carried signage exceeding the size restrictions set forth in subsection 36-142(a)(3); and
  - (xii) Bicycles, automobiles, and mopeds.

This subsection shall not apply to law enforcement officers while in the discharge of their duties.

- (6) The organizer of a picket, or the person designated in the permit as the one who will carry the permit shall be responsible for posting conspicuous signage at the picketing location informing participants that open carry firearms are prohibited for the duration of the picket.
- (7) Picketing done contrary to this section shall be unlawful. Police or City personnel may confiscate any of the items listed in the subsection 36-142(a)(5) if a picket participant refuses to remove the prohibited item from the picketing site, with the exception of firearms in accordance with S.C. Code Ann. § 23-31-520. A firearm or ammunition may be seized or confiscated pursuant to lawful arrest.
- (b) Picketing Permit.

- (1) No picket is required for picketing by a group of less than ten individuals on a sidewalk, or by a group of less than 25 individuals on the grounds of a City-controlled park or plaza, or in other City-owned areas or rights-of-way normally used or reserved for pedestrian movement
- (2) A permit application must be submitted to the City Administrator or his designee in a form approved by the Administration Department and in accordance with the time limits and guidelines established in Table 72.016. The Administration Department shall make the picketing permit application form available online, and at multiple locations throughout the City, including City Hall and the municipal complex. The permit application shall include the following information:
  - (i) The name, address, and contact telephone number of the organizer of the picket;
  - (ii) The name, address, and contact telephone number of the person who will carry the permit if different from the organizer;
  - (iii) The specific location where the picket is to take place;
  - (iv) The date and time the picket will begin and end; and
  - (v) The anticipated number of participants and the basis on which this estimate is made.
- Upon application in accordance with subsection § 72.020(b), the City Administrator or his designee shall immediately issue a permit at no charge. If an application is submitted for the same date, time, and location as an application for which a permit has already been issued, a permit shall be issued for a location as close as reasonably possible to the location set forth in the application; permits issued are subject to amendment in order to conform with this provision. Notwithstanding the foregoing, a picketing permit shall not be issued for the two hours preceding or the two hours following the time period for which picketing permit has been issued for the same date and location; permits issued are subject to amendment in order to conform with this provision. The permit shall contain all information stated in the application. The organizer of a picket, or the person designated in the application as the one who will carry the permit, shall be responsible for maintaining the permit and shall present it when so requested by a law enforcement officer or other City official. A person or entity hosting a picket under this section must post signs at the picket indicating that open carrying of firearms in not allowed at the picket. The City reserves the right to post additional signs indicating that open carrying of firearms is prohibited at the picket.
- (4) Spontaneous pickets which are occasioned by news or affairs coming into public knowledge less than 48 hours prior to such picket may be conducted in front of City Hall and the organizer(s) first will be deemed to have applied for a picketing permit under this subsection, and a permit shall be issued at no charge as soon as possible. In the event the designated area cannot safely accommodate the number of persons assembled, a shift commander or supervisor of the Police Department of the City shall direct the picketers to a suitable alternate location. For the avoidance of doubt, the requirement to pose signs as set forth in Appendix A applies to spontaneous pickets.
- (c) Interference with pickets. It shall be unlawful for any person to interfere physically with such pickets in the use of the sidewalk or address profane, indecent, abusive, or threatening language to or at such pickets or others to breach the peace.
- (d) Crowd dispersal. A shift commander or supervisor of the police department of the City may, in the event of the assemblage of persons in such numbers as to tend to intimidate picketers pursuing their lawful objective through numbers alone or through use of inflammatory words or threatening gestures that are ordinarily used to intimidate people, direct the dispersal of persons so assembled, and any police officer may arrest any person who fails to leave the place of assemblage when so directed by the police.
- (e) Restrictions. Persons engaging in picketing activity cannot do so inside an area designated as an event area for which a permit has been granted to another individual or group under this article, if the picketing behavior has the effect of interfering with, hampering, hindering, or getting in the way of those participating in the permitted event in accordance with its purposes or with the general public making use of the space for its ordinary and customary purposes. Whenever any police officer or municipal employee charged with monitoring or supervising event activity determines the picketing behavior is interfering with, hampering, hindering, or getting the way of others, as provided in this section, then the officer or employee may direct the picketers to relocate to other public space in reasonable proximity where such conduct can continue, if lawful, so long as the picketing does not interfere with, hamper, hinder, or get in the way of persons participating in the event for its intended purposes or of members of the general public making use of the public space for its ordinary and customary purposes.

### Appendix A: Picketing Table

An organizer of a picket that the organizer knows or should reasonably know will be by a group of a size set forth in this table shall give at least the corresponding minimum advance notice of intent to picket set forth in this table to the City Administration or his designee in order for a permit to be issued.

201-400	Any public place allowed under subsection 72.020 (a)	5 calendar days
Greater than 400	Any public place allowed under subsection 72.020 (a)	7 calendar days

Subject: Use of recovery funds for sewer project

Dear Natalie,

I am requesting approximately \$1.2M in recovery funding be allocated to a wastewater extension along S. Goose Creek Blvd.

The City was approached by a regional law firm planning to relocate their headquarters to S. Goose Creek Blvd. Their property is not served by public wastewater. The project owners would prefer access to sewer rather than use of a septic system. As such, their consulting engineer provided preliminary drawings demonstrating the feasibility of running sewer from Camelot Drive to their property. In addition, we were provided with a preliminary design and cost estimate for extending the new sewer line to other parcels in the corridor (See Attachments). The amount I am requesting is based on the cost estimates of the project owner's consulting engineer, plus 20% for design work. Final costs will be determined once final engineering plans are drawn and bid for construction are received; however, I believe the \$1.2M estimate to be reasonable.



Natalie,

Economic Development is requesting to begin a partnership with Lowcountry Local First for business training and recruitment. LLF are experts in promoting and growing local businesses, developing entrepreneurship training, and assisting minority owned business. The total partnership cost is \$142,800 which includes several services over a two-year partnership period.

I have appended their full proposal, but the package will include:

#### **Two Good Enterprises Program Cohorts**

The Good Enterprises Program will provide hands-on training in business planning and management for existing and aspiring entrepreneurs. Each cohort will be composed participants with a class composition of a minimum of 70% low-income participants, based on area AMI. One cohort will be delivered in English, and one in Spanish. Graduates will receive a year-long access to LLF's Business Accelerator Services program, providing them with furth one-on-one expert assistance.

#### **Existing Business Training**

LLF will deliver four workshops for business owners through their *Good Business Workshop Series*. The workshops will business development training to address the most pressing challenges, skills gaps, and business climate issues facing local business owners. Business owners will have access to subject matter experts. The topics will be explored and finalized by partnering with Goose Creek staff.

#### **Holiday Season Buy Local Campaign**

LLF will work with staff, and within existing marketing contracts, to create a buy local campaign. This will include an official Buy Local Pledge, Buy Local Market Calendar, certified Local Badges to enhance Goose Creek Local's efforts, and other holiday marketing efforts.

#### **Community Storefront Challenge**

LLF will partner with the City of Goose Creek to hold a *Community Storefront Challenge*, with the goal to incubate minority business owners who seek opportunity in a brick and mortar establishment and to provide economic opportunity for those who live in the City of Goose Creek. This competition will be facilitated by business experts. Staff and LLF will work to find willing property owners and identify other funding to create a one-year subsidized lease rate for the winning entrepreneur.

All of these programs will greatly enhance the current capabilities of the economic development office. Essentially, the partnership expands staff capabilities without additional FTEs. It also allows us access to LLF's members, whom we can recruit through these programs to open businesses in the City. Finally, it helps us recruit and bolster minority business in the City.

## Goose Creek Open for Business:

## **Entrepreneur and Small Business Training and Support**

September 22, 2021









#### **Overview**

Lowcountry Local First (LLF) will create and execute a program for the City of Goose Creek to provide business development training for existing local businesses and aspiring entrepreneurs.

With the reopening of our communities as pandemic conditions continue to improve, small businesses still face a long road to recovery and significant hurdles. An April 2021 national survey of small businesses found that 1 in 4 (25%) small business owners report they may not survive the next three months, and the same percentage report business conditions are somewhat or greatly declining compared to one month ago. Additionally, Black-owned small businesses continue to experience disproportionate setbacks and 37% say they may not survive the next three months (Survey of 533 small businesses, April 26, 2021, Small Business Majority).

Now is the time for local government to utilize partnerships and investment to ensure their homegrown businesses have a fighting chance and the tools they need to thrive. The following outlines a program build-out, delivery, and cost for a 24-month partnership between City of Goose Creek and Lowcountry Local First.

#### **Timeline**

YEAR ONE: January 2022 through December 2022

YEAR TWO: January 2023 through December 2023





### **Details**

## 1. Good Enterprises Entrepreneur Program:

**LOWCOUNTRY LOCAL FIRST'S GOOD ENTERPRISES INITIATIVE** is a catalyst for reshaping the entrepreneurial ecosystem to one that provides equitable opportunity for business ownership to transform lives and communities. Through the adoption of a nationally recognized and proven curriculum, one-on-one coaching, and an access to capital model, Good Enterprises supports economic development opportunities directly in the communities that need it the most.

**WHO WE SERVE:** The average entrepreneur at Good Enterprises is a 41-year old mother of two children with a low income household, who does not have savings to start a business.

#### **DELIVERABLES:**

- ◆ Two Cohorts of the Community Business Academy: English and Spanish: Two 12-week courses over the 24-month partnership located in the City of Goose Creek offering hands-on training in business planning and management for existing and aspiring entrepreneurs. Each cohort will be composed of 15-22 participants with a class composition of a minimum of 70% low-income participants, based on area AMI. One cohort will be an English-language class and one cohort will be a Spanish-language class: 'Academia Empresarial de la Comunidad.'
- Dusiness Acceleration Services (BAS): Graduates of the Community Business Academy will receive a year-round suite of services called Business Acceleration Services (BAS) to take their business to the next level, with options to pair with a business coach and complete a 90-day sprint of one-on-one coaching, as well as access to the Business Acceleration Services workshop series (held throughout the region and virtual) and the digital 'Help Desk.'
- Credit to Capital: When an entrepreneur is ready to pursue financing, Good Enterprises provides comprehensive assistance and resources, utilizing our relationships with community banks and community development financial institutions.





#### **MEASURING IMPACT:**

Over a full program cycle of two years, we track the following metrics for program participants:

- New business starts
- Business strengthened
- Business expanded
- Full-time job creation
- Change in business sales
- Change in household income

Change in use of public assistance
 COST: \$34,500 PER YEAR



## 2. Existing Business Training

Through our *Good Business Workshop Series*, Lowcountry Local First provides business development training to address the most pressing challenges, skills gaps, and business climate issues facing local business owners. We bring in subject-matter experts and successful founders to provide relevant content for busy, small-business owners to walk away with tangible strategies to sustain and grow their companies.

#### **DELIVERABLES:**

- Develop, market, and execute [4] training workshops located in the City of Goose Creek for existing local business owners.
- Determine topics in partnership with the City of Goose Creek Economic Development team and the Goose Creek Small Business Alliance, such as marketing, business planning, e-commerce, accessing capital, navigating governmental processes, etc.

**COST: \$4,800 PER YEAR** 





## 3. Buy Local Season: Public Awareness Campaign

Buy Local Season is an annual public awareness campaign (Nov-Dec) focusing attention on local retailers, food and beverage businesses, and personal service providers during the critical holiday sales season. The campaign provides increased visibility for participating local businesses to reach customers, as well as educates the public on the vital importance of supporting their local, homegrown businesses during the holiday season and beyond. Municipalities are key partners in this campaign, and campaign sponsorship is a tangible, highly-visible way to show support to small and local businesses in your community. Reach: LLF's membership base spans 400+ businesses strong, with a digital footprint of more than 74,000 across Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, newsletter, and mobile app.

#### **DELIVERABLES:**

- ▶ Launch a 'Pledge to Buy Local,' asking citizens to pledge to shift 10% or more of their holiday spending (gift giving, hosting, dining out, etc.) to local businesses.
- Launch the Buy Local Market Calendar, a go-to place to find area makers' markets and holiday markets.
- Hyper-Local Shopping Days, a series of community-level "cash mobs" driving blitzes of consumer support to participating local businesses.
- Deliver a marketing campaign encouraging citizens to look for the "Certified Local" badges in storefronts, easily identifying neighbors they can support and know that more of their dollars will stay in the local economy. This campaign includes street banners, print ads, radio commercials, billboards, posters, postcards, and more.

**COST: \$5,000 PER YEAR** 





## 4. Community Storefront Challenge + Business Attraction

LLF will partner with the City of Goose Creek to hold a Community Storefront Challenge, with the goal to incubate minority business owners who seek opportunity in a brick and mortar establishment and to provide economic opportunity for those who live in the City of Goose Creek. The objective is to add to the vibrancy of the neighborhood and expand on the economic opportunities that support local-independent businesses.

To enter the competition, hopeful entrepreneurs must submit an application and a business plan, reflecting the well-thought out idea for their business. A group of stakeholders and business owners from both the City of Goose Creek and Lowcountry Local First will review the applications. Selected businesses will receive subsidized rent for up to three years with stepped annual increases to market rate, membership with LLF, mentorship, marketing, and accounting support. This public-private partnership will seek out willing commercial property owners and other funding opportunities to provide the rent subsidies for the program.

#### **DELIVERABLES:**

- Identify suitable retail space in partnership with City of Goose Creek and commercial property owners in the area.
- **Deliver Store Competition** with City of Goose Creek.
- Recruit potential local businesses from Lowcountry Local First's membership base of more than 400 companies, representing 12,000+ employees.
- **Provide process to vet candidates** and announce winners.
- Provide wraparound business support services for incubated businesses, focused on marketing, PR, and accounting.
- Implement ribbon cutting ceremonies with City of Goose Creek.

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#### **A RESOLUTION**

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE EXPENDITURE OF AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT FUNDS

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2021, H.R. 1319, better known as the American Rescue Plan, was signed into law; and

WHEREAS, this \$1.9 trillion emergency relief bill provides \$65.1 billion to municipal governments to respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency, offset revenue loss, bolster economic recovery, and make necessary investments in water and sewer infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, the City of Goose Creek has been allocated \$21,738,356.51 in American Rescue Plan funds which will be distributed in two tranches; and

WHEREAS, economic and workforce development initiatives that are a result of the COVID-19 public health emergency are an allowable expenditure of these funds; and,

WHEREAS, necessary investments in water and sewer infrastructure are an allowable use of these funds; and,

WHEREAS, improving outdoor spaces and building stronger neighborhoods and communities are an allowable use of these funds; and,

WHEREAS, capital investments in public facilities to implement COVID-19 mitigation tactics, including ventilation improvements are an allowable use of these funds; and,

WHEREAS, the amount committed for economic and workforce development initiatives will be \$142,800, and the amount committed for capital projects will be \$3,750,000.

NOW, THEREFORE, BASED UPON THE FINDINGS OF FACT REFERENCED AND SET OUT ABOVE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Goose Creek, South Carolina, that:

- 1. The committed amount of fund balance from the American Rescue Plan Act Fund for economic and workforce development initiatives will be broken out into the following project category:
  - a. Partnership with Lowcountry Local First for business training and recruitment \$142,800.
- 2. The committed amount of fund balance from the American Rescue Plan Act Fund for capital projects will be broken out into the following project categories:
  - a. Wastewater extension along South Goose Creek Blvd \$1,200,000;
  - b. Amphitheater at the Municipal Complex \$2,500,000;
  - c. COVID-19 scrubbers for HVAC Units \$32,000;
  - d. Outdoor workout equipment around the pond at the Municipal Complex \$18,000.

The City is requesting to use \$32,000 of the American Rescue Plan Act funds to install Ultraviolet Germicidal Irradiation (UVGI) Air Scrubbers for our HVAC units. These scrubbers help eliminate COVID-19, in addition to the following:

- Destroys 99% of all surface and airborne contaminants
- Removes allergy and asthma triggering contaminants
- Purifies air, removes volatile organic compounds
- Protects HVAC system from buildup
- Creates cleaner, safer indoor environment
- Use light waves and a catalytic process to produce scrubber ions hydroperoxides that destroy contaminants on surfaces and in the air
- Proven effective in independent studies against bacteria, viruses, mold, and fungi.


